Directions to Bakas:

From Race Track Road turn east onto Ecclesia Dr; go .2 miles and bear right onto Canopy Dr; Canopy Dr turns right and becomes Splendid Ln for 300 feet and then turn left onto Canopy Dr which changes its name to Whisper Lake Trail. At the end of Whisper Lake Trail you will find the Bakas Equestrian Center, 11510 Whisper Lake Trail. Total distance is 1 mile.

The schooling show season is over and the rated show season is beginning. Both of our shows should have excellent attendance. The June show is always popular and the new September show is at an ideal time; a virtual last chance to qualify and close enough to regionals to be a tune-up. The September show also removes the summer lull between SDCTA events.

We are looking to updating how we keep in touch so that members can keep track of Dressage events in our area. That seems to be a trend. USDF has a new phone App which is a little different. GOING FOR IT!: The Adventure of Dressage for a Not-So-Young New Rider By: Debra Cangialosi


Ever since I was 5, I loved horses. When I was in 6th grade, I went to Red Raider Camp in Ohio for a 6 week adventure where I rode a horse for the very first time. After that, I had a trail ride here and there but never had any formal instruction until last year. Prompted by the realization I was approaching retirement age, I placed learning dressage at the top of my bucket list. I didn't want to procrastinate full-filling my dream one day longer, I contacted Royal Blue Stables with trainer Elizabeth Campbell then found my horse, Chloe. I fell in love with Chloe and a sport which challenges me each day. Dressage has a language of its own so the learning included a brand new vocabulary, overcoming fear of falling, learning how to care for horses, and of course, learning the tests in order to compete.
